**Summary:** United States deputy assistant secretary of state, Democratic Party official, author, and public speaker. Journals, family papers, correspondence, memoranda, reports, lists, speeches, interviews, drafts of writings, scrapbooks, photographs, newspaper clippings, and other printed matter documenting Louchheim's public service and leadership in the Democratic Party.

## **Acquisition Information**

The papers of Katie Louchheim, United States deputy assistant secretary of state, Democratic Party official, author, and public speaker, were given to the Library of Congress by Louchheim between 1973 and 1986. Additions were given by her daughter, Judith Louchheim Read, in 1991 and 1994. Opera libretti with accompanying correspondence were transferred to the Manuscript Division from the Library of Congress Copyright Office in 1976.

## **Processing History**

The Katie Louchheim Papers were arranged and described by C. L. Craig in 1974. Additional material was incorporated into the collection in 1980 by Mary Wolfskill, in 1986 by Paul Ledvina, and in 1997 by Margaret McAleer with the assistance of Susie Moody . The collection was rehoused in 2000. Political memorabilia received in 1983 was added to the collection in 2010.

## Transfers

Items have been transferred from the Manuscript Division to other custodial divisions of the Library. Some photographs have been transferred to the Prints and Photographs Division. Audio recordings have been transferred to the Motion Picture, Broadcasting, and Recorded Sound Division. All transfers are identified in these divisions as part of the Katie Louchheim Papers.

## Scope and Content Note

The papers of Kathleen Scofield (“Katie”) Louchheim (1903-1991) span the years 1906-1991, with the bulk of material dating from 1942 to 1968. The collection documents Louchheim's prominence in Democratic Party politics, including her tenure as vice chairman of the Democratic National Committee from 1956 to 1960, and her Department of State appointments as deputy assistant secretary for public affairs, 1962-1963, community advisory services, 1963-1966, and educational and cultural affairs, 1966-1968. The collection includes family papers, general correspondence, journals, social calendars, subject files, interviews, speeches and writings, photographs, memorabilia, and scrapbooks arranged in eleven series: [Family Papers](#), [General Correspondence](#), [Subject File](#), [Speeches and Writings](#), [Scrapbooks](#), [1978 Addition](#), [1986 Addition](#), [1997 Addition](#), [2010 Addition](#), [Classified](#), and [Oversize](#).

The [Family Papers](#) consist largely of letters to and from family members and include some of the collection's earliest letters from Louchheim, largely to her husband, Walter C. Louchheim, and mother, Adele Joseph Scofield, between 1926 and 1961. The series also contains letters from Walter Louchheim while attending the Bretton Woods Conference in 1944. The papers of Adele Joseph Scofield reflect her numerous charitable activities and interest in politics.

The [General Correspondence](#) series documents Louchheim's involvement in Democratic Party activities, her State Department tenure, and the social life of Washington, D.C. Correspondents include Barry Bingham, Mary Caperton Bingham, Hale Boggs, Lindy Boggs, Bennett Cerf, Albert Gore (1907-1998), Pauline La Fon Gore, Florence Jaffray Hurst Harriman, Hubert H. Humphery, Lady Bird Johnson, Abigail Q. McCarthy, Eugene J. McCarthy, Stephen A. Mitchell, Sam Rayburn, Edwin O. Reischauer, Haru Matsukata Reischauer, Bess Wallace Truman, and Charles E. Wyzanski. There are also personal notes from presidents Harry S. Truman, John F. Kennedy, and Lyndon B. Johnson and from Adlai E. Stevenson (1900-1965).

The [Subject File](#) concerns positions held by Louchheim with the Democratic National Committee and the State Department as well as her association with various committees and organizations. The largest segment pertains to her years at the State Department from 1961 to 1968 and details her involvement with special welfare projects abroad, her endeavors to enlist the interest and support of women and women's organizations in international cultural affairs, her efforts to increase contact between the department and the American public, and her oversight of community relations with foreign visitors, exchange programs, foreign student affairs, and foreign service specialist programs.

Material in the [Subject File](#) relating to the Democratic National Committee provides insight into grassroots and national politics, especially women's activities. The series also concerns Louchheim's postwar work with displaced persons and refugees with the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration (UNRRA) and her membership on Lady Bird Johnson's Committee for a More Beautiful Capital during the 1960s. Other information on the UNRRA can be found in the [Speeches and Writings](#) and the [Family Papers](#) series.

The [Speech and Writings](#) series includes drafts and publicity copies of speeches, correspondence, travel arrangements, press releases, and clippings. Included are speeches delivered by Louchheim for the Democratic National Committee and for Democratic candidates throughout the country. Her speeches on behalf of the State Department explore aspects of official policies, women's activities, volunteer programs, beautification projects, foreign affairs, educational and cultural programs, and the department's activities at home and abroad. In foreign countries, Louchheim was called upon most frequently to speak about the status, employment, and rights of American women.

Many of Louchheim's published and unpublished writings relate to social and political life of the nation's capital. "Protocol in Washington," an unpublished book-length manuscript, includes interview material with prominent Washington hostesses of the late 1940s. Her political memoirs were published as *By the Political Sea*. Several short stories and plays further

explore the interplay between Washington's social and political life. The series also includes Louchheim's poetry, most notably a collection published under the title, *With or Without Roses*. Correspondence from publishers, editors, fans, critics, and friends in the publishing field is also included.

The [1978](#) and [1986](#) Additions contain family papers, general correspondence, subject files, and speeches and writings. Many of the same correspondents listed in the General Correspondence and Subject File series, including Walter H. Annenberg, Evangeline Bruce, Angier Biddle Duke, Robin Chandler Lynn Duke, India Edwards, and Henry Ehrlich, can be found in these series as well. Also included are files on Louchheim's work in the State Department, Unesco, and UNRRA, as well as some of her speeches and writings. The [1986 Addition](#) contains photographs and additional scrapbooks.

The [1997 Addition](#) includes journals kept by Louchheim from 1942 to 1981 describing life in wartime Washington, Democratic Party campaigns and conventions during the 1950s and 1960s, and Louchheim's State Department positions. Her descriptions of Washington's social and political life constitute the largest part of the journals. The volumes, many of which include partial indexes, contain accounts of political figures, many of whom were Louchheim's close friends. Frequently mentioned and quoted are Paul M. Butler, Liz Carpenter, William O. Douglas, Albert Gore (1907-1998), Florence Jaffray Hurst Harriman, Hubert H. Humphrey, Lyndon B. Johnson, Lady Bird Johnson, John F. Kennedy, Robert F. Kennedy, Eugene J. McCarthy, James Reston, Dean Rusk, Theodore Sorensen, Adlai E. Stevenson, and Harry S. Truman. Interviews conducted by Louchheim in 1985 and 1986 for a book on prominent women include Kitty Carlisle, Betty Furness, and Constance Baker Motley. The [2010 Addition](#) consists of political campaign buttons and other memorabilia.
